Keynote Address: Dr. Reuben Jonathan Miller

"Halfway Home: Race, Punishment and the Afterlife of Mass Incarceration "

Wednesday, 7:00-8:00 pm, Lehman Auditorium

Over half a million people are released from prison each year. They join a staggering twenty million Americans who live with a felony record. They return to a new world, where over 44,000 laws and policies dictate where they may go, with whom they may live and how they spend their time. This is mass incarceration in America, but it's a reality we don't hear enough about. Professor Miller was confronted by these brute facts, as a chaplain at the Cook County Jail in Chicago during the height of mass incarceration, as the son and brother of formerly incarcerated men and as a sociologist studying mass incarceration's afterlife. Miller has spent a career walking alongside people we've learned to be afraid of and the families who suffer with them. His work reveals a simple, if overlooked, truth: mass

incarceration has an afterlife, and that afterlife is its own form of prison. Join us as Professor Miller shares his work and as we look to find a way out.

Dr. Miller's book, *Halfway Home: Race, Punishment and the Afterlife of Mass Incarceration*, will be available for sale, with the author available to sign your copy. The cost of the book is \$25.00. Cash, check, or credit card payments will be accepted.

The book is a portrait of the many ways mass incarceration reaches into American life, sustaining structural racism and redrawing the boundaries of our democracy. Drawing from fifteen years of research, over 250 in-depth interviews with citizens whose lives have been touched by the criminal justice system, and his own experience as the son and brother of incarcerated Black men, Miller shows how the American carceral system was not created to rehabilitate. Instead he reveals how its design keeps classes of Americans impoverished, unstable, and disenfranchised long after they've paid their debt to society.

Learn to Communicate Through an Interpreter
Spanish interpretation simulation event
Thursday, 8:30-11:30 am, Roselawn 206 and 221

EMU students from human-relations professions such as education, health care, social work, or business, are invited to learn how to communicate effectively through an interpreter. During a 15-minute session,

individuals will experience the correct way to use an interpreter to conduct an oral meeting in a service setting.

Students from SPAN 340: Introduction to Translation and Interpretation invite their colleagues to engage in role-plays of situations typical to their majors. For example, education majors can conduct a conversation with a Spanish-speaking parent, a nursing major could practice taking vitals or asking questions about a patient's health history, or a social worker could discuss program eligibility or the sociological needs of a family. The students from SPAN 340 will take the roles of the interpreter and the client of services; the other student will bring the expertise from their field of study and learn how to phrase questions, respond to questions, and communicate most effectively through an interpreter.
