All coffee breaks will be held in University Commons, 2nd floor, building #3 on the campus map. Display tables will also be available here.





César García is General Secretary of Mennonite World Conference (MWC), an global communion comprised of 1.5 million members around the world in the Anabaptist Tradition. García is from Bogotá, Colombia, and his appointment in 2012 marked the first time a leader from the Global South has served in this leadership role. He has been a church planter, pastor and professor of Bible and Theology. Prior to his appointment, García was chair of the Iglesias Hermanos Menonitas de Colombia (Mennonite Brethren Churches of Colom-bia) and Secretary of the MWC Mission Commission.

"FACING DOMINATION FROM BELOW"

CÉSAR GARCÍA – SESSION 1

In this presentation, César reflects on how the programmatic speech of Jesus at the beginning of his ministry, according to the Gospel of Luke, invites victims of domination to respond to their circumstances in the context of oppression. In so doing César uses insights from his Colombian experience and the Anabaptist Tradition to propose critical topics in the peacebuilding ministry of the church.

"PEACEBUILDING IN THE CAPITALOCENE"

JOERG RIEGER - SESSION 2

They have treated the wound of my people carelessly, saying, 'Peace, peace,' when there is no peace." (Jeremiah 6:14). Peacebuilding encounters new challenges at a time when the power of money has come to determine the lives of people and the planet, shaping not just economics and politics but also our relationships, values, faith, and theology. What new inspirations for peacebuilding might we draw from the Hebrew prophets, the Jesus movement, our faith traditions, as well as from cooperative economic efforts, and what might this mean for the future of the church?

Tigist Tesfaye Gelagle – SESSION 3

This talk concerns the philosophy of education framed in the Christian tradition which now faces challenges due to the diversity of culture, ideas and identity. Peacemaking traditions are also facing a challenge as well. We are now reconsidering our philosophy of education, based in the foundation of restoration of the image of God in every human being, through de-secularizing the education system and reclaim our Christocentric education which prioritizes reconciliation and restoration of our identity as peacemakers to bring peace, justice, and development to society.

PEACE THROUGH INTERFAITH DIALOGUE

• Lindy Backues and Achmad Munjid- Deep Listening, Deep Respect: Authentic Friendship as the Basis for Interfaith Understanding – A Case Study Involving a Friendship between Lindy Backues (Christian) and Achmad Munjid (Muslim).

We take a deep and abiding humble relationship to be the bedrock of all promising interfaith dialogue. With this seminar, Backues will put forward the necessary contours of his now 15-year friendship with Dr. Munjid, a relationship that has spanned experience both in Indonesia as well as in the United States (mainly in Philadelphia).

• Paulus S. Widjaja - Peace Spirituality in the Public Sphere: The Manifestation of Peace Virtues in the Encounter between Christians and Muslims in the Special Region of Yogyakarta

This presentation explores how Christians and Muslims living in Yogyakarta, Indonesia encounter each other in the public sphere. It explores whether their behavior in public spheres correlates with peace spirituality represented by peace virtues.

• Danang Kristiawan - From Colonialism and Trauma to Friendship: Historical Evaluation and Future Prospects in Theological Discourses and Relationships Between Mennonites and Islam in Java

This presentation examines the history of Mennonites in Indonesia including its historical connections with colonialism and trauma and current interfaith relationships.

• George Lakshmalla - Ecumenical and Interfaith Approaches to Peace in India: Mennonite Perspective

This paper explores the Mennonites' ecumenical and interfaith approaches to peace in India, highlighting conditions for ecumenical and interfaith approaches to be effective and also exploring their limitations.

EMBODYING PEACE: EXPLORING THE ETHICS OF PEACE

Schulyer Pals - How to Build more Equitable Cities
 Equitable cities allow anyone to participate in the life of the city accessing all the
 benefits it provides. Increasingly, however, cities are barring individuals from
 participating in their benefits simply by the price of admission. Costs for housing and
 transportation force people out of cities or entirely bar them from ever living there.
 This paper addresses two culprits one creating the global affordable housing crisis,

zoning and transportation. Combined these primary drivers force people from cities; often marginalizing them and exposing them to the most predatory aspects of our societies. Creating equitable cities requires addressing these two issues as quickly as possible.

• Wendy Kroeker - Anabaptist Peacebuilding Education: Navigating Nonviolence Creatively

This paper will examine the Anabaptist theology of nonviolence from the perspective of the teaching task within the Anabaptist Mennonite educational contexts. Can we strengthen the resistance to violence via the pedagogies we utilize? When we eliminate violence as an option for resolving conflicts, we make room for creative alternatives.

• James Jakob Fehr - Nonviolence and Pacifism: Conversations and Controversies in Germany

This paper discusses the current crisis of pacifism in the European public discourse and searches for a way to analyze and reinterpret this discussion in a way that makes it more practical and less theoretical.

- Doug Kauffman Pastoring for Climate and Peace Activism
 - There are numerous intersections and overlaps between climate activism and peace activism. This paper explores the similarities and contrasts of engagement and disengagement on peace and climate change and pastoring related to these issues.
- Christiane Karrer Biblical Inspiration for a Sustainable Worldview: The Meaning of Justice in the Bible

This paper explores biblical texts and concepts that support environmental justice. The paper asks how the Biblical view on justice can inspire us to develop a more integrated, sustainable worldview.

• Steve Pardini - *Climate and Environmental Justice* The poor and marginalized who contribute the least to ecological destruction are often the ones most affected by it and have the fewest resources to deal with the consequences of climate change. This presentation explores climate injustice from an ethical and economic perspective.

MENNONITE PEACEBUILDING IN MAJORITY MUSLIM CONTEXTS

• The interaction between Christians and Muslims is a global issue that demands intentionality and sensitivity from followers of Jesus. Building relationships across these religious and cultural divides is an important task for Anabaptists worldwide. Peacebuilding with Muslims will vary depending on the context. This workshop will consider the various contexts where Christians, particularly Anabaptist Christians, are in a minority and Muslims make up the majority.

INTERCULTURAL AND INTERSECTIONAL BIBLE READING

 Intersectionality allows space for multiple oppressive systems and realities to be challenged. In this workshop, we explore this topic through a Contextual (intercultural) Bible Study (CBS). The aim of this workshop is to increase people's awareness on the importance of an intersectional approach to justice and peacebuilding. CBS is used as a tool to challenge participants' own positionality and bring forward new perspectives. Furthermore, we aim to explore how to challenge patriarchy, white supremacy, and other oppressive systems.

WORKSHOP: Jan Willem Stenvers and Daniel Serrano Bernal SSC 001 THE CLASH OF THE STRONG AND THE VULNERABLE HUMAN: CREATING SAFE SPACES FOR PEACEMAKING

• Through two images of La Crista and a naked Christ in the cross accompanied with Biblical texts this workshop will challenge participants to engage in a conversation about their own vulnerability and 'inner-peace.' Explores how vulnerability and innerpeace are reflected in their faith communities, context, and theologies in order to find out how it can be 'used' as a tool to shape (youth)-communities to work for peace.

WORKSHOP: Elizabeth Snyder PLAYING FOR PEACE: DIGNITY CONSCIOUSNESS EMBODIED CREATIVITY, AND **COMMUNAL CONNECTION**

 This interactive "playshop" will use the improvisational method InterPlay – movement, storytelling, stillness, and song – to explore the vital role of dignity in our work as peacebuilders. Participants will engage the conference theme of "coming together" via artistic expression that creates awareness, builds trust, offers opportunities for sharing, and promotes pathways for individual and collective peace.

IDENTITY AND DIFFERENCE

- Scott Holland Democratizing Humanity and Divinity as the Path to Just Peace With Christian Nationalism and other expressions of autocratic religion and politics dominating much global God-talk in the 21st century, a deep democracy will require moving beyond political strong men as well as moving beyond strong theological gods. This paper will contend that the fertile seeds of both peacebuilding and democracy are present in Anabaptism as well as a "weak theology" strong enough to counter the taste for theological tyranny.
- Elizabeth Eby Beyond Cancel Culture: Uniting around Different in the Book of Acts This paper examines how current political discourses and polarization can foster the breaking of relationships. It then uses the book of Acts as a case study to how and why we can remain in relationships amid difference.
- Marie Anne Subklew "We Were Prepared for Everything but not for Candles and Prayers": Transformative Spirituality on the Example of Peace Circle in the GDR This presentation looks at the transformative example of peace circles in Germany. It describes how spirituality can become a catalyst of change for a whole community.
- Jacob Alan Cook An Intentional Counter-Witness to Reactionary Authoritarianism With current conversations around Christian nationalism in the background, this paper will explore how a practical, relational theology centered on Jesus cuts against the reactionary authoritarian posture of all too many people who identify as Christian in the world and contributes to a genuine sense of freedom and agency within church-communities.

CONTEXTUALIZING PEACE

 Elizabeth Miller - From "Social Action" to "Life Abundant": The Historical Development of Anabaptist Peace Theology Among Colombian Mennonites, 1970-2000

This paper argues that the primary external dialogue partners for Colombian Mennonites in the development of an articulated peace theology were the socialpolitical dynamics of the Colombian context broader Latin American movements and Anabaptist leaders in other parts of Latin America.

- Janna L. Hunter Bowman <u>Immigration Peacebuilding</u>
 In a world in flux, and considering the limitations and problems of the 'sanctuary' model, what new immigrant-led orientations might North American churches take in their work to support immigrants? The project pivots on one immigrant women's intervention in a gathering with churches preparing to provide sanctuary in their buildings in 2017, focusing on how this orientation contributes to peacebuilding.
- Daniel Moya <u>Truth-Finding and Transitional Politics</u>: An Analysis on Truth-finding and its Relation to Post-Peace-Accord Contexts in Latin America, through an Exploration of the Political Thought of Hannah Arendt

Truth-finding is a central task during a peace process, yet, is a disputed and conflictive one, as observed in recent peace processes in Latin America. How do practices of truth-finding and truth-telling, facilitated by Truth Commissions in Latin America, prevent or promote the transition to peace, and how does Hannah Arendt's political thought contribute to the debate?

• Anthony Khair- <u>Peace in the Midst of Occupation</u>: A Palestinian Narrative of Peace and Resilience Amid Occupation

Anthony will speak from his personal experience being a Palestinian Christian about the concept of peace and justice. In addition to, stories about migration, oppression, loss of land, and resilience in the Palestinian context.

PERSONAL TRANSFORMATION AND PEACE

 Schuyler Pals - <u>Forgive Them Their Debts</u> Predatory lending has been with humanity since the earliest days of recorded civilization, and we have attempted to deal with it since its inception. We need loans for college, to buy a home, and to buy a car. Understanding how the Church has historically addressed interest bearing loans and predatory lending and contrasting it with how a contemporary North American conception of lending allows us to see what we miss when we consider how financial institutions lend and how individuals get trapped by debt. Combining this conversation with how the law has developed in the United States shows us how we have addressed the issue in recent history, how we are currently addressing it, and how the Church can approach this issue going forward.

Manjula Patnaik - <u>The Journey Amidst Trauma and Healing</u>

This paper examines the acceptability and primary efficacy of positively addressing conflicts, stigma, and discrimination of People Living with HIV (PLHIV) and their caregivers by adapting positive psychology, healing, and resilience in addressing trauma. Understanding the social and psychological context of the trauma, helped in creating the right social intervention for healing at social and personal levels.

 Eliane Gerber - <u>Nonviolence and Communication Design</u> This paper explores 3 questions: How can we use communication to counter and resist violence? How can we communicate nonviolence not only in what we say but in how we say it? And how do we become sensitive to violence in our own communication?

PEACE IN RELATION TO WAR

 Dan Ott & Jeremy Fuller - <u>Moral Injury & Corporate Sin: Justification and Justice after</u> <u>War</u>

This paper explores implications of learnings about moral injury connected to the doctrine of sin. The paper wrestles with the corporate nature of sin for warring societies and nations. The heart of the argument is that perhaps the greatest tragedy of moral injury is that warriors are left alone to deal with the moral implications of their actions.

• Stella Mbangu Kayenga - <u>Assessing the Challenges of Armed Conflicts and the Role of</u> <u>Peacekeeping Mission in War-Torn Countries</u>: The Case of Democratic Republic of Congo, 2011-2020

Armed conflicts have emerged as the most prevailing form of depicting political and socio-economic grievances against ruling governments. To explain why the DRC

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continues to experience cycles of armed conflict, this paper will look at why that is, despite having the longest and largest peacekeeping mission. What factors explain the limited success of peacekeeping mission in a war-torn country such as the DRC?

• Janna L Hunter Bowman - <u>Returning a Book to its Roots: Witnessing Peace Back in</u> <u>Colombia</u>

The presentation reports on the book *Witnessing Peace*, rooting in 8 ½ years of working with Justapaz in Columbia, followed by several years of academic research carried out during visits and virtually. The author soon aims to facilitate spaces for the protagonists of the book to speak into how they are represented, how the author and them theorize with and about them, and how the approach illuminates, or fails to illuminate, what is going on today in Columbia.

THEOLOGICAL JOURNEY TOWARDS PEACE AND JUSTICE

 Paul Doerksen - <u>The Collateral Damage of Peace: David Adams Richards, Mercy Among</u> <u>the Children</u>

The novel *Mercy Among the Children* investigates the moral and spiritual dimensions of violence and peace. This paper will focus on the sacrifices demanded of those characters who live with the cost of someone else's vow of peace.

Karl Koop - Early Anabaptism and Social Protest

Narratives describing developments in Mennonite peace studies in the last century have noted the shift in emphasis from separation and nonresistance to active peacebuilding and a concern for justice. This presentation argues that the concern for justice is already observable in early Anabaptist social protest.

• Derek Suderman - <u>Tackling Violence in the Prophets as a People of Peace: Anabaptist</u> <u>Approaches Then and Now</u>

Writing a commentary on the prophetic books of the Bible for an Anabaptist audience presents a significant challenge since much of this material describes, and at times celebrates, God's judgement of evil-doers. This paper outlines various approaches to violence in the prophets articulated by contemporary Anabaptist scholars in contrast to writings from the early Anabaptists.

PEACE AND DECOLONIZATION

• Mzwandile Nkutha - <u>Towards a Decolonial Turn: (Re)Thinking Ethics of Peace and</u> <u>Justice Otherwise</u>

What does it mean for the colonized (racially disposed) to do theological ethics of peace and justice otherwise? What might be the protocols of embodying such practices of peace and justice in a world (in)formed through colonial and imperial Christianity?

- Thirza Snoek <u>Abraham Kiyper's on Islam Revisited: A Critical Review using Edward</u> <u>Said's Orientalism</u>
 - This paper examines Abraham Kuyper's writings on Islam, specifically the ones collected in the book On Islam. Postcolonial and decolonial knowledge can help to deconstruct Orientalist discourse, and in this paper, the concepts of testimonial and hermeneutical injustice are used to start thinking through a decolonization of harmful ideas.
- Tala Bautista <u>Decolonizing and Localizing Peacebuilding through Social Enterprise</u> Tala, of the Sumacher tribe from the Philippines, will be sharing their indigenous worldview and how they do peacemaking in their contexts. She will share her journey on integrating the Peace theology from a Mennonite organization and her community's core values – paniyaw, ngilin and ba-in. She will give a concrete example of how these values are practiced in Coffee for Peace, a coffee social enterprise, as a tool for decolonization and peacebuilding.

GENDER, JUSTICE AND TRANSFORMATION

 Defrita Rufikasari - <u>Women as Agents of Peace and Justice</u>: Study of the "Aksi Kamisan" in Indonesia and Rizpah Story in II Samuel 21:1-14

The "Aksi Kamisan", a silent sermonstration has been going on for 16 years in Indonesia, initiated by Maria Katarina Sumarsih, Suciwati, and Yati Indriyani as a forum to express their demands for the tragedy of the death of their children and siblings in the Semanggi 1 and 2 tragedies as well as other gross violations of human rights in Indonesia. Through "Aksi Kamisan", this paper invites us to understand the role of women as agents fighting for justice by women both in "Aksi Kamisan" and Rizpa's

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story in the Bible. This contemporary context is dialogue with biblical, theological, and social contexts to produce alternative narratives that show women are able to be actively involved in humanitarian issues and to regain justice.

- Jayaker Yennamalla <u>Gender Justice and Peace in India: Mennonite Response</u>
 This paper highlights some of the issues and challenges to promoting gender justice
 and peace in India and a Mennonite response to it.
- Fernando Enns and Andres Pacheco Lozano <u>Introduction to an Ecumenical Theology of</u> <u>Companionship</u>

In this paper, we will present key aspects of the emerging Ecumenical Theology of Companionship. It seeks to provide an alternative to the traditional notion of "accompaniment" within the ecumenical fellowship.

This supports the main activity of the workshop: a collective discernment based on inter-contextual Bible reading of Luke 11:1-11 and Genesis 37.
