Message from the Vice President for Diversity, Equity and Inclusion

Dear EMU community and friends,

I am grateful to all of the staff at EMU who worked hard over the summer to ensure we have a great start to the semester. It is exciting to have our students, faculty, and staff back on campus. We have had days full of events and activities as we welcome new and returning students to campus, onboard new faculty, and our returning faculty get back into the rhythm of teaching.

Amidst the celebratory mood on campus, we also recognize that DEI programs throughout the nation are under political pressure to curtail initiatives that move us towards equity and inclusion. We continue to see in the news how many state legislatures are advancing bills that target transgender individuals and discriminate against them. You may also have read the latest US Supreme Court decision on affirmative action—*Students for Fair Admissions, Inc., v. President and Fellows of Harvard College*—curtailing the practice of considering the race of student applicants as part of the admission process.

At EMU, as I shared in an email this summer in [response to the US Supreme Court ruling](#), we stand together in solidarity with ALL members of our community. Our mission, vision, and values are guided by Micah 6:8—“What does the Lord require of you, but to do justice, love mercy, and walk humbly with your God?” Our values demand that we uphold principles of love, compassion, and justice for all individuals. We have the moral responsibility to create an environment where everyone can flourish, feel safe, and be true to their authentic selves. As EMU’s alumna Leyman Gbowee ‘07—2011 Nobel Peace Prize awardee—has stated:

"We must continue to unite in sisterhood to turn our tears into triumph. There is no time to rest until our world achieves wholeness and balance, where all men and women are considered equal and free."

Inspired by Micah 6:8 and our alumna Leymah Gbowee '07, we started our fall semester full of hope, energy, and aspirations. The work you all do matters! And as you can read below, some great things happened last semester, and some extraordinary initiatives are coming next.

New Office of DEI Logo and T-Shirt

During Homecoming, be on the lookout for the first EMU Belong Together t-shirt with our new logo. Our tagline, **BELONG TOGETHER**, encapsulates the heart of our mission. Through our threefold approach—Disrupting, Connecting, and Vibing—we're forging a path toward a more inclusive and equitable campus experience.

The selected colors of this t-shirt symbolize the unity within our campus community. Royal blue has represented EMU for decades, serving as a unifying brand element across departments and programs. Purple is the official color of EMU's Seminary, while green represents the Center of Justice and Peacebuilding. All three colors come together to represent every facet of EMU, serving as a reminder that genuine change happens when we are Connecting and building relationships with one another.



The light yellow hue is a secondary color at EMU and we have chosen it to remind us that those who have historically been 'secondary' are also part of our community. It reminds us of our responsibility as an Anabaptist Mennonite university to embrace all members of our community, especially those who have been disproportionately marginalized. The lively light yellow color also reminds us that as challenging as advancing DEI is, we must find time for Vibing together by celebrating our milestones.

The intersecting wavy lines serve as a powerful visual reminder. They evoke the very landscape of our campus—nestled in the valley, surrounded by mountains—a metaphor for our journey toward equity and inclusion, which is anything but straightforward. These lines also stand for the diverse identities that intersect within our community, and the crossroads of power dynamics we navigate daily. Disrupting these power dynamics can lead to a transformational ripple effect in our community.



Discover the Inclusivity in Science Mural
